Everyone knows the drill: easy plane hop to St. Thomas in the U.S. Virgin Islands; cab ride to the Red Hook docks; and brief, sleepy ferry ride to the welcoming arms (and expensive hillside villas) of St. John. That's a Caribbean classic escape for a reason, but it's vibe shift time: Instead of ferrying over to St. John, now you can hop aboard a bespoke ferry at Red Hook to whisk you to another destination altogether, just 10 minutes away: a private island resort with high-design glamping tents and treehouses (above), plus a pair of one-bedroom cottages and a three-bedroom villa. ## Mustique

STAY: THE MUSTIQUE COMPANY VILLAS AND THE COTTON HOUSE There is style, and there is Mustique Style. Credit British theater designer Oliver Messel, who applied that stage-set sensibility to a tiny island in St. Vincent and the Grenadines purchased in 1958 by his countryman Colin Tennant. Initially imagining Mustique as a place to farm, Tennant revised the script a decade later and developed the island into an exclusive hideaway. It worked. With Messel guiding the transformation of the island's former plantation house into a hotel, The Cotton House, and 18 villas (including Les Jolies

Eaux for early Mustique adopter Princess Margaret) tucked among the jungle and palms, the allure and design sensibility of Mustique was hatched-and remains a Caribbean institution more than a half-century later. Here is where the most celebrated celebrities. from royals to rock stars, still decamp to relax, to hit the weekly cocktail mixer at The Cotton House and jump-up dance at Basil's Bar, to picnic under thatch along the island's superlative beaches, and to enjoy the barefoot insouciance of it all. And it's possible, by renting one of 82 villas available or tucking in at The Cotton House, to draw that Mustique Style around one like the couture it is; mustique-island.com.
